A native of Logan County, KY, Teddy had lived in Arlington, VA since 1956. She was married to Ernest Saulmon for 69 years until his death in 2008.

Teddy was a woman of wisdom, dignity, grace, kindness, humor and boundless love. A simple notice is too short to describe the breadth and beauty of her life.

After raising her four children, she worked for Arlington County Public Schools. She served as a docent at Arlington House for over 30 years. She was the President of the Arlington Historical Society and served on the Arlington Historic Affairs and Landmark Review board. She and Ernie were early supporters and fundraisers for the Arlington Outdoor Education Association. She was a member of PEO Chapter D. She and Ernie attended Clarendon United Methodist Church. She is survived by her large loving family. Her four children: son Ernie Saulmon and wife Bobbi, daughter Susan Trice and husband Bob, daughter Conchita Mitchell and husband David, and daughter Sarah (Sally) Gabler and husband Ed Neunlist; nine grandchildren: Rob, Samantha, Michael, Stephanie, Jason, Seth, Lyda, Max and William (who all thought they were her favorite); and eight great-grandchildren: Eric, Leo, Ozzie, Hazel, Posey, James, Mark and Malorie as well as many nieces, nephews and friends who adored her.

Arlington School Board Chief Ernest Saulmon, 94

Ernest Eugene Saulmon, 94, a veterinarian and former chairman of the Arlington County School Board, died of cardiopulmonary failure March 25 in Virginia Hospital Center in Arlington.

Dr. Saulmon served on the School Board from 1968 to 1972 during the discussions about whether to desegregate the county's last all-black school, Drew Elementary. He was chairman when the board, under pressure from parents and a federal investigation, proposed closing Drew and busing the black students to other schools, after some white parents objected to busing white children to the school. The school reopened instead as a mixed-race model school with a specialized curriculum.

"He agonized over those decisions, but he really thought he did the right thing," said one of his daughters, Sally Gabler of Arlington.

Dr. Saulmon helped create the Arlington Career Center for vocational education and was an original member of the Arlington Outdoor Education Association, where he was chairman of the board from 1973 to 1981. The group raised money to buy a Loudoun County farm that became

the Phoebe Hall Knipling Outdoor Laboratory for environmental education.

In 1983-84 he was board chairman of the Arlington chapter of the American Red Cross, a group with which he had long been involved.

Dr. Saulmon was born in Posey County, Ind., and followed his father, a veterinarian, on visits to local farms, which earned him the nickname "Little Doc." He graduated from Ohio State University with a degree in veterinary medicine and joined the Agriculture Department's Bureau of Animal Husbandry in Kentucky.

The Agriculture Department sent him traveling around the world and posted him in Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Louisiana and Virginia. He settled in Arlington in 1956.

Dr. Saulmon retired from the Agriculture Department as director of the Animal Health Division in 1973.

He had been a member of Clarendon United Methodist Church since 1956. He was also a member of the Cosmos Club as well as numerous veterinary and animal health organizations. He served on NASA's Interagency Committee on Back Contamination, which established quarantine protocols for lunar samples brought back from the first moon landings.

In retirement, he enjoyed golf and volunteering. He traveled and attended Elderhostel programs for many years.

In addition to Gabler, survivors include his wife of 68 years, Teddy Saulmon of Arlington; three other children, Ernest Saulmon Jr. of Austin and Susan Trice and Conchita Mitchell, both of Arlington; nine grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

2. **William Townsend**, son of Presley Ephraim Townsend and Amanda Offutt, was born on 09 Oct 1860 in Logan County, KY (appears to be named Willie at birth but is sometimes referred to as Major William, M W and William Major Townsend). He died on 29 Apr 1919 in Holly Grove, AK. He married **Sarah Alma Boyd** on 19 Aug 1907 in Madisonville, Hopkins CO, Kentucky.
3. **Sarah Alma Boyd**, daughter of George Washington Boyd and Elizabeth Frances Barker, was born on 16 Jan 1877 in Logan County, KY. She died on 24 Apr 1978 in Arlington, VA.

Notes for William Townsend:

The real name of Will Townsend seems to be a mystery. A family bible of Presley Ephraim and Amanda lists him as Willie, as if this is his given name. The census of 1870 also lists him as Willie. An account was found that said that he added the "Major" to his name because he admired a cousin, William P. Townsend, who was an army major. He is sometimes listed as M. W. Townsend. His second wife, Alma Boyd Townsend, always referred to him as "Will Townsend himself".

All stories indicate that he was a very interesting man. His first wife died in 1894, leaving him a widower at the age of thirty-four. He was then the father of four children, ages seven months to eleven years old. It is believed that the children were sent to live with others. The 1900 census has him living with his brother-in-law Rubin Peneck. The only child listed on the census that might have been his is G Hunt. Two years after his wife died, his father died and he inherited some money. Family lore says that he quickly spent his inheritance. There are tales of him winning a steamboat in a card game and simply walking away from it. Someone who knew him once referenced the fact that he "ran with Angel boys" indicating he lead a wild life for some period of his life.

Thirteen years after the death of his first wife, he married Sarah Alma Boyd who was thirty at the

time and had never been married. Their first child was born eight months later. When faced with the new family and wife to care for, Will worked in the area around Logan County Kentucky in the construction field. Within a year, he had moved the family to Arkansas where he built cabins, moving ahead of the turn-of-the-century sawmills. He built homes for the crews that were moving along the Mississippi River, clearing lumber.

Will and Alma moved from Blytheville to Burdette, finally settling in a community near Palmer and Ragtown. They purchased some timberland to be cleared for farming. They picked a site for a home. It was here, in Arkansas, just twelve years after his marriage to Alma, that he died in a logging accident. He and Alma were out in the woods, their children (Elizabeth eleven years old, Presley nine years old and Maude Catharine "Teddy" two years old, were in the care of another family for the day. A tree fell in an unexpected manner, falling on Will as Alma watched. She had to find her way back to their home alone to get help.

Some old letters found in the papers of Martha Butt Cheek indicated that Will attended Hickory Wild School for Boys in Olmstead where he learned to play the violin among other things. Another letter said "if we had television in those days he would have been in the front line as an entertainer. He was extremely attractive, full of fun, witty and clever, and amazing at repartee."

Will is buried in Frank's Cemetery south of Holly Grove, Arkansas.

On her 100th birthday in January, 1977, President Gerald Ford sent greetings and people came from 12 states in a bitter ice storm to help celebrate at the small community center in Arlington, Virginia where she had gone to live with her daughter's family.

When the first man landed on the moon in the 1960s, Alma's comment to her granddaughter, was that she had lived too long from the horse-and-buggy days to a man on the moon.

Alma and both her daughters were born without the legal right to vote; however, in 1920 at age 43, the 19th Amendment finally was ratified by the final and last state needed for ratification. It happened in Nashville, Tennessee, just a few miles from her home in Logan County, KY.

As a child, Alma, along with her family, was a member of the Berea Christian Church in Logan County, KY. Both her parents and she and 3 of her siblings, as well as many other relatives, are buried at the Berea Christian Cemetery.

Her Mother died five days after the birth of her youngest child, when Alma was only age 11. Alma, as the eldest child was called on to help with the other children. Her father George W. Boyd fought on the Union side in the War Between the States a few years before she was born.

She married the love of her life Major William Townsend, in Madisonville, Hopkins, KY on 8/19/1907. He was a native Kentuckian but died in 1919, in a tragic accident while working in Arkansas, leaving her to rear 3 small children alone. "Major" was a name used by Mr. Townsend but it was not a military title, but rather a name he adopted as part of his name.

After the death of her husband Alma went back to Kentucky and lived for a time in Louisville, Kentucky and then returned to her native Russellville, Logan, KY where she was a faithful member of the First Christian Church where she regularly took her son and two daughters. They were close friends with its long time pastor, Rev. Edward Coffman and his wife Emma. Reverend Coffman wrote a history of Logan County, KY in his elder years in which he mentioned Alma and her daughter Maude Catharine, who was the only child left in the home at the time he wrote.

Alma was an expert seamstress and sewed for the public, as well as sewing many of the clothes for her children and grandchildren. She made dozens of hooked rugs from wool cloth cut into narrow strips, that were considered genuine American Folk Art by all who saw them.

Alma's tenacity came from her Scotch-Irish and German immigrant ancestors and she succeeded as a single Mother, in rearing a fine family. She had 17 grandchildren, 13 of whom are living in 2014. There are several great and great-great grandchildren also surviving.

Sarah Alma was born to George Washington Boyd and Elizabeth Frances "Lizzie" Barker Boyd. She was the oldest of their six children:

Sarah Alma Boyd Townsend - b: 1877; d:1978 - married to Major Will "Willie" Townsend (son of Presley Ephraim Townsend and Amanda Offut Townsend).

Ernest Neal Boyd - b: 1879, d: 1964 - married to Alma Jones.

Maude Boyd Krevdo - b: 1883, d:? - married to Stepney Krevdo.

George Daniel Boyd - b:1885; d: 1949 - married to Nancy Orndorff.

Hattie Boyd Veu Casovic - b: 1888; d: 1980 - married to Ira S. VeuCasovic.

She has seven daughters surviving in 2017 who are not listed for privacy reasons.

Elizabeth Townsend (Sanford) graduated from Russellville High School in Russellville, Logan County, KY in 1927. She attended Bethel College in Russellville where she met her husband who was captain of the basketball team there. According to her sister, she was known as the prettiest girl in Russellville.

Elizabeth was a lifelong member of the Disciples of Christ Christian Church. At the time of her death, she was a member of the First Christian Church of Hopkinsville, Christian County, KY.

She was a lifelong Democrat and worked the polls every election after her children were grown. She supported Adlai Stevenson for President and later found out that

she was distantly related to him.

After they married in 1928, Elizabeth and "Sanford" set up house-keeping at 18th & Woodland in Springfield, TN where their first daughter was born. "Sanford" soon got a job in Ohio and they were there for a short time. They returned to Robertson County, TN to run "Sanford's" father's farm and there, five of their children were born.

They left the Sanford homestead to serve as tenant farmers for Miss Emma Gill in the same county. One daughter was born there. They next, purchased a farm, during the height of the Great Depression on the Orndorff Mill Road in Logan County, KY where two more children were born.

They soon outgrew the 200 acres and went to South Christian County, KY to run a farm for Carlisle Kirkpatrick. Their last two children were born there and three of their oldest children were graduated from Sinking Fork High School nearby (later consolidated with Christian Co. High School circa 1959).

While on the Kirkpatrick farm Elizabeth raised a huge garden and canned hundreds of quarters of food to be stored in the old underground cellar. Her children remember setting under the trees in the back yard stringing beans that were brought in with large wash tubs. Her mother Alma Boyd Townsend, often spent the summers helping harvest the garden and sewing dresses for the little girls. Elizabeth raised chickens and was forced to live very frugally during WWI because of rationing of so many food products such as sugar. When her last two children were born "Sanford" rushed to the county office to get their ration books, which remain among family records today.

In 1949, Elizabeth and "Sanford" purchased a farm in South Christian County near Pembroke, KY and five of their children graduated from the local Pembroke High School.

Elizabeth was very active in the West Fork Homemakers Club and a leader in the 4-H Club that her children attended. She served as President of the PTA at the local Pembroke School and was very faithful to take her children to the Pembroke Christian Church where 3 or 4 were baptized and 3 were married. She said in her later life that her years in Pembroke from 1949 through 1958 were the best of her life. She had a full house of daughters' friends and son's friends and made all feel welcome.

"Sanford"'s father J.C.Sanford, Sr. was widowed in 1948, and he later came to live with them on the Pembroke farm. He died in 1956 and willed his home place near Adams, TN to "Sanford." They sold the Pembroke farm and remodeled the old house on the home place and enrolled their last three children in Jo Byrnes High School where their only son graduated.

Sadly, Elizabeth and "Sanford" split up in 1959 and she purchased a home in Hopkinsville, KY where she moved with her two youngest children and an older daughter who lived in the same city. The youngest two children graduated from Christian County High School. Elizabeth never re-married.

Elizabeth's ancestors were some of the first to settle in Kentucky and Tennessee. She was a descendant of at least three famous Revolutionary War soldiers, namely 2nd great grandfather Ephraim McLean, Sr. 1730-1823, (find a grave # 9122587; DAR chapter in his name in Southern Tennessee) Robert Ewing, Sr., b: 1/16/1693 d:6/25/1787, who fought in the battle at Point Pleasant with Capt. Thos. Bedford.(See Peaks of Otter, Virginia D.A.R. chapter that bears his name). Elizabeth was a 1st cousin, 3 times removed, of Brig. General William Lee Davidson (find a grave #6624028) who died in a battle with the British Army on February 1, 1781 at Cowan's Ford, N.C.and after whom Davidson Co., Tennessee is named.

Elizabeth's maternal grandfather George Washington Boyd (b:4/11/1841 b: 9/25/1915) - Find a grave #76194913 of Logan County, KY served in the Union

Army in the War Between the States. Although they lived only a few miles apart, her paternal grandfather Presley Ephraim Townsend supported the Confederacy and was required to sign an 'oath of loyalty' to the Union during that conflict.

- ii. George Presley Townsend was born on 21 Apr 1910 in Blytheville, AK. He died on 09 Dec 1965 in New Orleans, LA. He married Jane Elizabeth Hopson.

Notes for Presley Ephraim Townsend:

By all accounts, Presley Townsend was a well-respected citizen in Logan County. He lived a few hundred feet east of the Old Red River Meeting House. His home was called Rosedale. A "Presley E." was received into the Red River Church and baptized in November 1859.

An undated obituary for Presley reads: "TOWNSEND,-P. E. Townsend was born in Logan County, Ky., Feb. 1, 1823, and died Dec.; 21, 1896, being the time of his death in his 74th year. He was a descendant and near relative of the Ewing family, famous in church and State, among the founders of Cumberland Presbyterianism who also came to Kentucky and brought the law with them. Brother Townsend sustained his family history, being a Christian gentleman of culture and intelligence than whom there was no more prominent in Logan County. He was a member of Red River church, and for many years one of her pillars. After the funeral services in the church, his remains were laid to rest in the Red River Cemetery. Brother Townsend was a practical Christian. His idea of religion was that it should touch and influence the lives of people and make this a better world to live in. Holding this opinion, he was ever ready with kind words and deeds, ever ready with an open purse to help in every good work. Fortune smiled upon him, and he never knew want of any comfort of life. Unlike most men of means, selfishness was foreign to his nature. It is said that no one who ever called upon him for assistance was turned away empty handed. He loved his church, and the prosperity of his church was his pride. During the last year of his life the Red River church house underwent extensive repairs within. After the carpenters and painters and paperhangers had done their work the church presented, a much more beautiful appearance within than without. So, Brother Townsend said: "I cannot die satisfied without seeing old Red River church painted without," and at his own expense he had this work done. Those white silent walls today speak in eloquent tones of his love for his church. Besides being a devoted Christian, he was a princely gentleman of the old style, of which class but few now remain. He was a grand man and all who knew him loved him. He leaves a family of six children, two daughters and four sons. One daughter is the wife of Dr. A. L. Butt, a prominent specialist in Kentucky, the other is the wife of Mr. R. B. Penick, who is a member of a noted family in Cumberland Presbyterian history. Two of his sons are prominent physicians, one in Logan County and the other in Bowling Green, Ky. The other two are farmers in Logan County. Bother Townsend's death is mourned by his children, his relatives and a very large number of friends. Though he is gone from us, his deeds live after him, and shall continue to live on, a gladdening and beneficent force -

"Until the stars grow old.

And the sun grows cold,

And the leaves of the judgment book unfold."

An undated item from a newspaper talks of a gathering at his home for Thanksgiving and

describes him as "a gentleman of the old school and true Kentuckian". The article is torn and hard to read but seems to indicate the party was presided over by Reuben Penick and his charming lady Mattie. Mattie is Presley Ephraim's daughter Martha. The article goes on to say "A royal turkey of magnificent proportions occupied one end of the ample board and was faced by a monster goose at the other, both served with the most delicious oyster dressing. Grouped around and between these two monarchs of the feast, were all kinds and varieties of viands, such as would charm the heart and tempt the appetite of any epicure. The little party [other guests were listed as Master Claude E Townsend of Dixie, Dr. R. P. Townsend, Ernest Fasey, F.L. McKernan and Dr. A. L. Butt] of guests enjoyed themselves to their fullest capacity and through all future life will revert with pleasurable recollections to their visit to Rosedale. They have marked the day with a white stone, and their sincere wish is, that the large hearted Christian proprietor and the jovial incomparable Mister Reuben may live to enjoy many more such delightful occasions as the dispensing of hospitalities to their friends affords them."

Elizabeth "Bessie" Davidson Townsend Butt, Presley Ephraim's daughter told a story that indicated that Robert Ewing Townsend, Presley's son, went to war in his place because Presley had a house full of children. Robert Ewing died in battle at the age of eighteen. Another story told by Bessie was about the Yankees trying to kill her father. The story was among the items found in the Filson Library in Louisville Kentucky in the Butt Cheek papers. The story in part said "Later, the Yankees came to try to kill Pa, knowing he was a southern sympathizer, and they (the Yankees) had been fed a lot of lies by our negro, young Henry (that Pa was harboring a lot of guerrilla ammunition), about the only mean slave we had ever had. He was always mean, even when he was little. He was part Indian. He later ran off and joined the Yankee army.

Old Mr. Elisha Gorham, who was an abolitionist, but a good old man, and always fond of Pa, heard about the Yankee plan, to go to Pa's and kill him (they had stopped at the Gorham's, house, and he rolled out a barrel of whiskey and got them all drunk while he sent a Negro man courier in a hurry to tell Pa to run and hide -- the Yankees were coming to kill him. He hid in a cave down near his Aunt Sophy Bowling's.

When the soldiers came they lined up in front of the house, and a lot of them were drunk on Mr. Gorham's whiskey (he operated a distillery). Mama told them they could search the house, that there was no truth in the statement that they were harboring spies and ammunition. Then she saw n***er Henry with the soldiers. She pointed her finger at him and said 'There is the scoundrel who told you those lies -- he always would lie.'

The officer agreed that he had already told them a bunch of lies, they had found out, and took his men and went on away. We always did have a soft spot in our hearts for the Gorham family, even poor old Sally.

Their house was up near where Whippoorwill Church, an old two-story brick over in the field to the left as you went toward Whippoorwill from Schochoh.

Pa had another old negro [originally this said slave but was marked through and negro hand written], also named Henry, and when Mama was so scared after Pa had gone the night before the Yankees came, old Henry came in and said 'Don't you be 'fraid, Miss Mandy. I'm gonna lay right down here in yo' room in the doah, and the fust Yankee sticks his head in this doah, I'll split his skull wid dis ax .' And there old Henry slept on the rug all night. She always loved old Henry."

The Logan County will book N (pages 550 - 552) contains his will. He left 1/3 of all his property, real, personal, or mixed to his wife Amanda. All of his children or heirs (they weren't named) received equal share in balance of estate and charges against accounts were to be considered. A codicil dated Dec 24, 1886 (witnessed by J.M. Pence and M.E. Orndorff) stated that an account book included unsettled accounts against either of the sons-in-law. A codicil dated Nov 5, 1891 appointed his son T.J. and his son-in-law R. B. Penick to administer the estate. It states that if his sister Jane P. Link lives longer than P.E. Townsend, the executors were to place two \$1,000 bonds in a safe bank and interest was to help support her and at her death, the bonds would revert back to the estate and be equally divided among his heirs.

Amanda Offutt and Presley Ephraim Townsend had the following children:

- i. Robert Ewing Townsend was born on 24 Mar 1845. He died on 20 Mar 1863 in Milton TN

Notes for Robert Ewing Townsend:

Elizabeth Davidson Townsend Butt reported that Bob went to war in place of her father because her father had a house full of children and was needed at home. A marker at Red River reads: Robert E. Townsend. Born March 24, 1845. Fell at Milton, Tennessee, March 20, 1863, fighting in defense of the Constitutional Rights of his Native South." He was 18 when he died.

There is a letter and it's transcription about his death on the battlefield.

- ii. Thomas Jefferson Townsend was born on 03 Jul 1846. He died about 1900 in Owensboro, KY.
- iii. Martha Jane Townsend was born on 06 Jul 1848. She married Reuben Penick.
- iv. Tilghman Offutt Townsend was born on 02 Feb 1850. He died on 02 Feb 1916.
- v. Presley Townsend Jr was born on 19 Feb 1852. He died on 16 Oct 1931. He married Fannie. She was born in Jun 1853.
- vi. Susan Ann Townsend was born on 17 Jul 1854. She died on 31 Mar 1855.
- vii. Joseph Faulconner Townsend was born on 11 Jan 1856. He died on 28 Dec 1868 (Died in a Christmas celebration in an explosion of gun powder in a log).
- viii. Gilson Ewing Townsend was born on 13 Mar 1858. He died on 22 Aug 1926 in Bowling Green, KY.

Funeral services were held last Sunday afternoon at Berea Church, the services being conducted by Mr. Jimmie Orndorff of Red Oak. Interment followed in Berea, cemetery. Logan Links, May 2016 said: George Washington BOYD served Union forces during the Civil War in the 8th Regiment KY Cavalry, Co. G, entered as private and mustered out as commissary sergeant.

A Devoted wife and kind mother. We offer our tenderest sympathies to the bereaved husband and family in their distress.

Mrs. Lizzie Boyd, wife of Geo. W. Boyd, of Logan County, Ky. died on the 23rd of December, 1888, and was buried in Berea Church Cemetery.

The Subject of the above notice was well worthy of very much more than a passing notice. She was, in many respects, a remarkable woman, and her influence was potent for good in all the relations in life in which she was thrown. Viewed morally, physically and intellectually, she was one of Nature's noble women. As a daughter, she was all her fond and doting mother could wish; at once the respectful, loving child, the kind and considerate counselor, the friend to whom the mother carried all her confidence, and from whom she always obtained comfort and sympathy. To her brothers she was the pet, the idolized and only sister, affectionate, considerate, and always ready in kindly ministrations, and the reciprocity of their feelings for her was abundantly manifested by their unceasing watching and faithful attentions to her during the period of her illness. The spectacle of those brave, manly brothers, hovering about her, with a touch as light and tender and hearts as unselfish and soft as that of a mother for her helpless babe, was a most beautiful and touching sight, and worthy of all emulation. To her husband and children she was fond, faithful and affectionate, living alone for them, and devoting her life to their comfort and welfare.

Notes for Thomas Jefferson Townsend:

Thomas Jefferson Townsend was the son of Thomas Townsend, a Scotsman and Anaphilida Watson Townsend. He married Elizabeth "Betsy" Ewing in 1805. They had seven children. Although both were born in Virginia, they lived only a few hundred yards to the west of the Old Red River Church in Logan County, Kentucky. The major portion of their home was still standing in 2012, covered with clapboard. It appears that Anaphilida moved from Virginia with her son after the death of her husband and left her land to him in her will.

Anaphilda Townsend settled on land just west of the Old Red River Church and cemetery, the same land she later mention in her will made August 9, 1798, in which she wished to 'give and bequeath to my beloved son, Thomas Townsend, the land plantation whereon I now live, also my negro woman named Sall and three negro girls, towit, Eve, Rachel and Fanny and their increase, also one mare, nine head of cattle, also my household furniture with two featherbeds and all the plantation tools and moveables, etc etc."

According to the terms of the will Thomas Jefferson inherited everything his mother owned and his only obligation was to pay each of the other heirs, or their heirs, five schillings or approximately \$1.25. They were Benjamin and Jabez Townsend, Delilah Smith's heirs, Didamia Webb, Betty Nowlin, Light Townsend and Lucy Nowlin.

There is also record of land acquired by Thomas Jefferson Townsend in Logan County, Kentucky was by order of the February, 1803 County Court which allowed him 200 acres of land.

The 1972 Riley Leon Townsend book states: "Twelve miles out of Russellville, Ky on the main highway to Nashville, stands an historical marker for the Red River Meeting House. One fourth a mile east of the marker the road crosses Little Whippoorwill Creek. Two miles from the turnoff, a white house with twin gables appears on the left. This is the old home of Thomas Jefferson Townsend and his mother Anaphilida, presently owned by Mrs. D. L. Robey. It is a beautiful, well-kept house and although it has been remodeled, the original rooms have been kept intact, even to the low seven foot ceilings and the narrow six foot high doors. The front entrance is on the west. The room to the left as a person enters is the one in which Anaphilida and Thomas Jefferson died. Their death bed was in the north east corner of the room."

On September 17, 1847, Thomas Jefferson deeded one acre of land to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church for \$1.00. It was acquired to increase the size of the burial ground of what is now Red River Church."

Several reference to Thomas Jefferson Townsend receiving a letter during the mid-1840s advising him he was an heir of an estate in England and that his wife refused to give her consent to his going abroad because the money was needed and he had a family to think of.

A copy of the will of Thomas Townsend is hard to read. Where a word cannot be deciphered, a ? is placed. The will reads:

I Thomas Townsend Senr. of the County of Logan and State of Kentucky do construe?? and publish this as my last will and testament. First I commend my soul to God + request that my body shall be decently buried by my estate. Secondly I ask that all my just debts be first paid after which I desire that all the estate that I may own or possess? at my death both personal or mixed be divided as for my wife Betsy D Townsend is to have one sixth thereof during her life and one sixth there of fee simple but with the power only of disposing of same as she may think

proper among any of her children or grandchildren. The residue of all my estate that I may own or possess ? at my death including the remainder in the one sixth left to my wife for life which shall not be consumed by her life time shall be equally divided among all my children that may be living at death giving to the children of my children the portion of their deceased parent if any of my children shall die leaving a child or children before my death. It is further my ? that my wife shall have the privilege if she desires to have her portions in my ? estate given as afore allotted so as to embrace the dwelling house, outhouses, and farm upon which I now live or upon which I may live at my death and as much timber as may be necessary to keep it up. And if the portion allotted to her shall not be deemed sufficient be distributed? when chosen by her and my eldest son for comfortable and independent support as well as the support of my child or children or child or children that she may desire to live with her an additional quantity that may be sufficient shall be allotted to her during her life without deduction for the portion bequeathed to her in my personal estate or slaves. It is also my wish that my wife shall have the choice of such slaves in her portion as she may desire to ? and the division of my estate in other respects it is my desire shall be made by ? when chosen by my wife and oldest son Robert. It is to be clearly understood the advancement which I have made or may make to any of my children in my lifetime, value of the same estimated at the time when made is to be deducted from the portion intended for the child so advanced and when I have not fixed the value myself ? some memorandum in writing the value is to be by the ? when chosen as it is my desire to produce entire equality among my children in the division of my estate. It is further my will that the one sixth part allotted to my wife during her life at her death is to be divided as before directed among all my children and the children of those that may be dead. I further bequeath to my granddaughter Victoria E Beauchamp and her heirs forever a certain Negro girl named E? her future increase also one bed bedstead and furniture and one horse, saddle & bridle is not to be brought into the division of my estate as before directed. It is further my will and desire that my son Presley E Townsend shall take the care and control of my unfortunate son Albert B Townsend and maintain him during his life also the care management and control of his estate for which services he is to have a reasonable compensation out of his estate to be selected by wife & oldest son as ?. But it is my will and desire and is hereby expressly understood that all advancement heretofore made or which may be made to my daughters all of which have been and will be made upon loan as well as the portion which shall fall to each of them in the division of my estate also the portion given to my granddaughter Victoria shall be vested in my son Robert J Townsend and Presley E Townsend & my wife & the survivors of them as trustees to have and to hold each of said portions in trust for the sole and separate use of my said daughters and granddaughters free from the control or disposition of their now husbands or any husbands which any of them hereafter marry but subject to be disposed of by either of my said daughters or granddaughter by will or otherwise if married by the written assent of said trustees or a majority of them or a majority of the successors and not otherwise but if married & of full age without such assent. It is further to be understood that the loans of property made or to be made to any of my daughters is to be made to any of my daughters is to be valued and treated as advancements in the division of my estate that is the same is to be valued and set apart to each at its value when loaned. It is further my will that my wife & her sons Robert J & Presley E Townsend or such as them as may be living at my death and may choose to qualify & shall be and act as my ? & executors and it is my wish and desire that they shall counsel and advise with E M Ewing both as ? & trustees as aforesaid in all things be directed by his advice and instruction. And if any difficulty should arise in the construction of this will or the distribution of the estate under it, it is my request that my children shall not go to law about but that the said matter shall be submitted to the award and final determination of said E. M. Ewing, and such other attorney or judge of law as may be chosen by my executors. It is further my will that my wife shall have for her life in addition to the portion before bequeathed to her such of the house hold & kitchen furniture & utensils including beds bedsteads and furniture & table furniture and all other furniture necessary for comfortable house keeping such as she may desire to retain including the poultry of all kinds and dead victuals or ? sufficient for the support of the family for one year also leather for anything else which she and my two sons Robt J & P E Townsend may select and set apart to my ? wife she is also to have for life such of my wagons carts ? horses oxen farming utensils cows sheeps hogs or other articles upon the farm necessary to carry on the same & for her comfortable support and living to be selected and set apart for her use by herself and my afd sons or the majority of them. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 7th day August 184? the witnesses attesting the same in my presence

Thomas Townsend."

The witnesses were listed as: G P Ewing, Geo W Ewing, E M Ewing, James B Spencer

A PS followed "Whereas my wife has out of her own means loaned to Conrad and Judkins upwards of five hundred dollars it is my will that she collect and apply the same to her own absolute use as belongs to her in ? whereof ? did the same to my ? will the date above." Three signatures follow - GP Ewing, E M Ewing, Geo W Ewing

Will of Daniel C Boyd dated 7th day of February 1871

1st I will and desire that all my just debts be paid

2nd I will that the land west of a line running from Hardings corner at the meeting house, running with Hardins line to R G Boyd's survey which my son John F Boyd now lives on to the said John F Boyd

3rd I will and desire that a line be now commencing at a rock on whipowell creek the beginning corner of the old Home Survey, and running to the east corner of the back field, thence with the back line of the said field, thence to Mrs Townsends survey so as to include thirty five acres of timber land from the home place including the tracts of land known as the Dare place and also the tract of land known as the Sam Beaty place I will to my son George W Boyd

4th It is my will that all the land that I own on the North Side of whipoweill creek known as the Barker places and also twelve acres of timber land to be cut off of the home place so as to be bounded on the end by G W Hummer and on the side by Mrs Townsends survey it is my desire that said lands shall go to my daughter Susan Boyd

5th I will and desire that my son William Boyd shall have all the balance of my land known as the home place, also the back of land known as the Charlott lot with exception of a good road for my daughter Susan to go to her timber cut off of said from track of land

6th I further desire that the lot of land on the east side of the track I gave to my son John F Boyd shall be equally dived between my two sons GW Boyd and William Boyd

7th I further will and desire that my son GW Boyd shall have five hundred dollars to make buildings on the land I have willed to him

8th it is further my desire that my daughter Susan Boyd shall have five hundred dollars to make buildings on the land I have willed to her

9th I will to my wife Catherine Boyd all my household and kitchen furniture including my stock and farming utensils to have and to hold during her natural life

10th I will that all the remaining part of my estate including my cash and cash notes shall be equally distributed share and share alike between my wife Catherine Boyd and my four children George W Boyd, John F Boyd, William Boyd and Susan Boyd.

Lastly and finely I hereby nominate and appoint my two sons JF Boyd and GW Boyd my lawful executors to my last will and testament.

From find a grave: George Washington Boyd was the son of Daniel Cotton Boyd (2/2/1808 - 1/18/1871) and Catharine Miller (Mueller?). His siblings included John Franklin Boyd, Sue Elizabeth Boyd, William Boyd and Thomas, who died in infancy.

He married Elizabeth Frances Barker and they had six children, including four daughters and two sons, namely Sarah Alma, Maude, Pearl Catharine, Hattie Elizabeth, George Daniel and Ernest Neal. His wife died five days after their youngest child was born and he was left to rear the children alone, the oldest of which was only age 11. They were reared "in the faith" at the Berea

Christian Church in Logan County where 5 of his children are buried alongside he and his wife.

At the age of 20, George Washington Boyd enlisted as a volunteer in the 8th Regiment of the Kentucky Volunteer Cavalry of the Union Army. The unit was active for about a year, guarding supplies in Morganfield, Hopkinsville and Bowling Green, among other Kentucky towns. In 1863, the 8th Regiment marched to Ohio, where its members apprehended famed Confederate raider George Hunt Morgan.

He survived the War Between the States and went home to Logan County Kentucky where he ran the family farm and welcomed his many children and grandchildren.

She raised a large family of boys, all of who save one, lived to the age of manhood, and by their honorable, upright lives, became the crown of rejoicing and an attestation of the purity of her own life. She raised only one daughter, Mrs. Lizzie Boyd, a worthy daughter of so noble a mother ? leaving an interesting little family, preceded her brother only a few weeks to the grave.

Mrs. Barker, never physically ? under the added burden ? her in caring for the ? daughter.

? a member of the ? church at Berea nearly ? of her married life, and by ? consistent walk, her devotion to ? brethren and sisters and all the ? of the church, attested the ? of her faith and the pruity of her motives.

She visited the widows and orphans in their afflictions, and did it in the name of Christ. Hardly a home in the community that she did not enter to minister to the afflicted, and to comfort the mourning. In many households, in the time of sorrow, she was the first to enter and the last to leave, and always carried with her the gratitude and love of those to whom she ministered.

In viewing her life work, and knowing of her delicate physical organization, it seems incredible that she could have accomplished so much with a large family dependent upon her. She was yet a model housekeeper. No matter when a friend called, he always found a warm welcome, a snug place at the fireside and a seat at a beautiful and well kept table. She met all the demands made upon her in her own home and when the community became acquainted with her efficiency in the sick room, she had no idle hours.

Just such lives as hers, gives us higher notions of the dignity of human nature, and a stronger faith in Christian religion, its duties and its privileges here, and its hopes and compensations hereafter. There must be rest, sweet rest, for the worn-out body of Sister Baker, and those like her who have expended their lives in the service of God and humanity.

Appropriate funeral services conducted by N.B. Dudley, in the presence of a large audience, were held at her residence, and her remains laid to rest by the side of her beloved husband in the family burying ground.

Notes for Thomas Townsend:

A letter dated 1898 to Hugh Townsend from T J Townsend indicates that Thomas was the first Townsend in our line to come to America. The letter says he came from Scotland [age 19]. There is a record of Thomas purchasing 151 acres of land in Pittsylvania CO on July 14, 1767. The land was bought from John Loving and was located "on both sides of cherrystone Creek, being the land said Townend lives on". It is recored in Deed Book 1, 1767-1770.

Among the items in the Louisville Kentucky Filson Library Butt Cheek papers, the following was found:

The item below was taken from a handwoven wallet carried by Thomas Townsend, the Scotsman.

"To All Whom It May concern

This may certify that Mr. Thomas Townsend was my neighbor many years in Rutherford County In the State of North Carolina and all the time bore the character of an honeft Well Disposed Man worthy of efteem for his honesty a vallueable Member of his .?. and although it appears by his Own Confession and Other Reports that he was in the enemy camp, yet upon trial so much appeared in his favor by favoring Our prisoners there and services done before and after his being with the enemy that he was cleared with honour and respect by every honest Man.

Certified by me the 19th Day of Aug. 1783

On the back was written:

"Pittsylvania Va.

The within was sworn to be by the within subscriber before us

The description of the Battle of Kings Mountain will explain why it might be necessary for Thomas to carry such an item. He would have been a traitor in the eyes of some. That might also explain why his family moved to Kentucky a few years after his death.

Thomas is found among a list of Tories from Rutherford County, NC who joined the force commanded by Major Patrick Ferguson during the King's Mountain campaign. Major Ferguson was the only Englishman in the battle, his command made up completely of men loyal to the King but living in North Carolina. Ferguson died at King's Mountain and his defeat was a turning point in the Revolutionary war. Thomas Townsend was among those who survived the battle and were taken prisoner. One account says that he received three balls in battle and was paroled to his home which was a mile from the Island Ford of Broad River. A diary entry of Loyalist Lieutenant Anthony Allaire dated November 15, 1780 says "marched sixteen miles to Camp's Ford of Second Broad river; forded it, and continued on three and a half miles farther to Island Ford of Main Broad river; forded it, and marched one mile to Capt. Townsend's plantation. This man received three balls in the action on King's Mountain, and was at home on parole. He was very happy to see us, and gave us the best his house afforded". While others were taken prisoner, it appears that Thomas was not. Those taken prisoner were taken to a Moravian settlement at Bethabara and held in a stockade. About thirty of the prisoners were tried in route to their prison and were hanged. Upon release, most of the prisoners moved to neighboring states and were eventually forgiven by their neighbors.

The Battle of Kings Mountain took place on October 7, 1780. Thomas was listed among about one hundred men who were charged on the second Monday of July 1782 and found guilty of "Wickedly & treacherously entending and Designing as for as in them lay to Overturn the present free Government of this State & reduce the Inhabitants thereof Under the Power of the Army of Great Britain then & now at Open War with this State and the United States of America did then & there with force and Arms feloniously & treacherously Knowingly & Willfully did aid & assist the said King by Joining his Army Commanded by Major [Patrick] Ferguson and by bearing Arms in the Service of the said King Against the Good Government Peace and Dignity of this State; and the Jurors aforesaid on their Oath aforesaid do further Present & say that by their felony and treason by them respective in Manner & form aforesaid Committed have Severally forfeited their Goods & Chattels lands & tenements to the State according to a form of An Act of As-sembly in Such Case made & provided." These men were among the men captured at the Battle of King's

Mountain serving under Ferguson.

Riely Leon Townsend's book says the following about Thomas Townsend.

"It is believed that the family of Thomas Townsend may have lived in Halifax County, Virginia for a time."

And "The first record found in Pittsylvania County, Virginia of land purchased by Thomas Townsend was dated July 14, 1767. This land was bought from John Loving and was located 'on both sides of Cherrystone Creek, being the land said Townsend lives on', which implies that Thomas evidently rented for a number of years. Cherrystone Creek heads close to the land of John Watson on Harpen Creek. ... The legal description states that the 151 acres bought by Thomas Townsend joined the land of John Thomas Watson. The transaction is recorded in Deed Book 1, 1767 - 1770 of Pittsylvania County, Virginia."

And "Old Thomas paid taxes in Pittsylvania County in 1785. This is shown in the 1790 Census, which is made up of Tax Lists.

And "Thomas Townsend apparently fought in the American Revolution with troops from South Carolina and at least one person joined the Daughters of the American Revolution on that record". [This doesn't address the issue that Thomas fought for the king].

Also from the Riley Townsend book: "He died ca May 20, 1796. In the Office of the Probate Judge in the court house at Greenville, South Carolina the settlement papers of his estate may be found. ... The Inventory was dated August 19, 1796. At the Estate Sale held May 3, 1797, Benjamin Townsend bought one negro woman and her children; Anaphilda Townsend, the widow, bought one flax wheel, one painted flask, one axe, one plow, one mare, one cow and calf, eight head of sheep, one negro and two featherbeds; Light Townsend (b. 1769) bought three bells, one musket and one trunk and Bryan Ward Nolin (son-in-law of Old Thomas) bought one negro for 30 pounds (\$150) and a 'lot of old iron' for 6s 6d (\$1.62)."

Notes for Anaphilida Watson:

The information below was taken from the Riely Leon Townsend book.

"After the estate of her deceased husband was settled Anaphilada Townsend went, with the majority of her family, to Logan County, Kentucky. This was probably during the summer of 1797, since she signed her will in that county on August 9, 1798."

The will, made and signed Aug 9, 1798, is below.

In the name of god, Amen. I, Anaphilidia Townsend of Logan County and state of Kentucky, being in perfect health of body and perfect mind and in memory, thanks be to God, calling into mind the morality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all to die, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament, that is to say principally and first of all I give and readem (sic) my soul into hands of almighty God that gave it, and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian Burial at direction of my Executors hereafter named and as touching such worldly Estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with, I give, demise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form --

First, I give and bequeath to my beloved son Thomas Townsen (sic) the land and plantation whereon I now live, also my negro woman named Sall, and three negro girls towit, Eve, Rachel and Fanny, and their increase, also one mear (sic) and nine head of cattle also all my household furniture with two feather beds and furniture, and all the plantation tools and moveables, etc. etc.

Also, I give to my son Benjamin Towsen, five shillings, to my son Jabus Townsen five shillings, to my deceased daughter Delilah Smiths heirs five shillings, to my daughter Didamia Webb five shillings, to my daughter Betty Nowlin five shillings, to my son Light Townsen five shillings, to my daughter Lucy Nowlin five shillings to be paid to them or their heirs by my son Thomas Townsen

Also, I do constitute and appoint my well beloved son Thomas Townsen sole Executor of this my last will and testament.

Signed by mark

Anaphilda Townsend's will is available from Logan County, Kentucky - Will book B page 24. The will lists Light as one of her children.

His will probated can be found in Book G pages 562 - 563 in the Logan County Wills and Settlements. He left a total of 21 slaves to his children.

It is belived he settled in Marlboro Couty South Carolina in the 1760s

Notes for Robert Ewing:

Jean Mc Gee has the orignial will of Robert Ewing. He was one of the signers of the petition of the Peaks of Otter Presbyterian Church in May 1774. He moved to Davidson County, TN, then NC in 1784; he was a member of the NC Legislture from Davidson County, 1787 - 1789 and was a member of the NC Convention of 1789 for adoption of the United States Constituion.

He moved to Logan County Kentucky in 1792 and was a member of the Kentucky State Senate from 1806-1818 and President of the Senate in 1818.

His tombstone reads: In Memory of General Robert Ewing, a soldier of the Revolution, who departed this life 14th day July, 1832 in the 73rd year of his age. He was born in Virginia in 1760, removed to West Tennessee in 1781, from whence he was elected and served two sessions in the North Carolina Legislature. Was married to Jane McLean on the 4th of July 1787, removed to Logan County Kentucky, in 1792; was elected to the Legislature of Kentucky in 1797 and served 21 years in succession, sixteen in the Senate and the last two as its president. He was the Oracle of his family, and among his neighbors emphatically a peacemaker."

From an album dated 1975: "General Robert Ewing came into Kentucky with his elder brother, Baker Ewing in 1779 but located for a number of years in Nashboro, until 1785/1786 when he was appointed a deputy surveyor of Virginia and laid out his military surveys in Kentucky district in preparation for moving into Kentucky. That which he did by 1792, when the state was formed."

From info on Finis Ewing: Finis Ewing was born on the 10th of July, 1773, in Bedford County, Virginia. His father and an uncle had settled there on their emigration from Ireland to this country, a number of years previous to the American Revolution. The two brothers seem to have ranked among the most respectable and prosperous farmers of the county. The older of the two, Robert Ewing, was for many years Clerk of Bedford County Court, and an elder in the Presbyterian Church.

Notes for Mary Jane McLean:

The following was taken from the Riley Leon Townsend book:

"Jane McLean Ewing was the daughter of Ephram McLean and wife, Elizabeth Davidson. Jane was born in western North Carolina in 1769 and died in Logan County, Kentucky in 1847.

She was in statue tall and stately, of handsome rather than pretty type, a queenly woman of the strong self-poised sort, well caluculated to give to the world sons and daughters for useful servie of an exalted character."

In the name of God, Amen, I, Samuel Offutt Senior of the State of Kentucky and County of Jessamine do make, ordain and declare this instrument to be my last will and testament revoking all others.

1. All my just debts are to be faithfully and fully paid and the legacies hereinafter bequeathed are to be discharged as soon as circumstances will permit and in the manner directed.

2. To my beloved wife, Elizabeth, I give & bequeath the use, profit, and benefit of the whole tract of land whereon I now reside, situate, lying and being partly in the aforesaid County of Jessamine and partly in the County of Fayette on the waters of East Hickman Creek and containing by estimation three hundred acres (be the same more or less) with all the improvements and appurtenances thereunto be- longing to her, the said Elizabeth, during her natural life. It is my will and desire that no waste be committed of timber on the premises, and likewise that a due rotation of crops be observed so that no fields or field be planted with Indian corn twice in immediate succession.

3. I give & bequeath to her, the said Elizabeth, during her natural life the following male Negro slaves, to wit: one named Nase and another called James or Jim, and the female slaves Becky and her increase and also Julia and Viney. I do further bequeath to her, the said Elizabeth, the choice of four head of horses, four head of Cows, twenty head of hogs, and twenty head of sheep out of the stock that may be on hand or remain at my decease. It is, how- ever, distinctly to be understood that if the said Elizabeth shall marry again after my decease, she shall forfeit all the benefit hereby otherwise intended and all claim whatsoever to the use and profit resulting from the mentioned land, Negroes and goods and chattels.

To my said wife, Elizabeth, I further give & bequeath for the term of her natural life with the same condition annexed, all the household and kitchen furniture and farming Utensils which may remain at my decease.

4. I give unto my eldest son, Andrew Offutt, the promissory note which I hold on him for the sum of seventy dollars with the interest thereon and release him from the payment of both the principal and interest.

5. I give & bequeath to my grandchildren, Charles Proctor, Elizabeth Proctor and Samuel Proctor, twenty dollars each and to Matilda Proctor, I give & bequeath one horse and saddle worth one hundred dollars when she arrives at the age of twenty-one, if she lives so long, otherwise the hundred dollars to return to my estate and be equally divided among my own children.

6. I give & bequeath to my son Rezin Offutt one Negro man named Harry.

7. I give & bequeath to my son Azra Offutt one Negro man named Charles.

8. I give & bequeath to my son Denton Offutt one Negro man named George.

9. To my daughter, Arah Offutt one Negro girl named Mary.

10. To my grandson, William Offutt Thompson, a Negro girl named Caroline and also a Negro boy named Gabriel.

It is my will & desire that my Executor hereinafter appointed do raise and educate my said grandchild, William Offutt Thompson, for whose support the said two Negroes are given and bequeathed and if said William Offutt Thompson lives to the age of twenty-one, then the said Executor to be allowed two hundred dollars out of the residue of my estate, but if he should not live so long, then said executor shall not have said allowance.

11. I give & bequeath to my sons, Otho Offutt, Tilman Offutt, Samuel R. Offutt, Rezin Offutt, Azra Offutt, Denton Offutt, and my daughter Arah Offutt, all the remainder and residue of my estate, real and personal (including all the estate) conditionally bequeathed to my wife Elizabeth during her natural life as above mention- ed and after her death to be equally divided among them.

12. Lastly, I constitute and appoint my son, Azra Offutt my sole executor of this my last will and testament.

I John Boyd of Logan County and state of Kentucky do hereby declare ordain and publish this as my last will and testament. In the first place it is my will and desire that all my just debts be paid.

Next I desire and will to my wife Susanne Boyd the one-half of the tract of land on which I live including the improvements and one half of the farm during her life time also all the farming utensils during the same time I also will her the following named slaves during her life time (to wit) Judy, Ned, Jacoby Laring(?) and Matilida and their increase also I give her a sufficient quantity of household and kitchen furniture and of all the stock necessary for carrying on the farm during her life but in case of the marriage of my wife it is my will and desire that Ned shall be hired out till my son James shall arrive to the age of twenty one years and then sold and the whole amount of said hire and the sale to be equally divided between all my children and my two grandchildren John B Burr and Martha W Burr. It is my will that my son James JW Boyd shall have as much of household and kitchen furniture and stock as my other children have received. Next I give to my son Daniel C Boyd the tract of land on which he now lives and which I have deeded to him and also the slaves Smith and Ellen and her increase. Next I give to my son Rezin GH Boyd the tract of land on which he now lives and which I bought of Elias Harding and others and which I had deeded to him by said Harding and others. I also give to my son Rezin GW Boyd the tract of land that I bought of Allen Campbell and had deeded to him by said Campbell. I also give to him the slaves Handy and Martha and her increase. Next I give to my daughter Patsy Pence and her heirs the tract of land she now lives on and which I have deeded to her husband Annias Pence. I also give her the slaves Mary and Amy and their increase. Next I give to my two grand children John B Burr and Martha W Burr children of my late daughter Courtney Burr the tract of land that I got of Peter and John Lion Constant of A Wilson and Henry LeGillam to be equally divided between them. The slave Aeline and her child Judy that I gave to my daughter Courtney Edmund Burr her husband has the disposal of them. Next I give to my son James TW Boyd the one-half of the tract of land on which I now live and at the death of my wife the other half of said tract. I also give him the tract of land I got of John DP Freeman. I also give my son James the slaves Ben, ?, and Emily, Robert and Hary. It is my will and desire that my wife shall have the use of the boy Robert during her life. It is my will and desire that at my death that out of the money on ? - cash notes and accounts that my son Rezin GW Boyd shall have paid to him ninety dollars to make his land and money that I have heretofore given him and for I hold his receipt equal to my son Daniels land. It is my will and desire that my two grand children John B Burr and Martha W Burr be paid out of the above mentioned monies four hundred and fifty dollars between them to make their land equal with each of my children and if there is left on hand any of the above mentioned moneys it is my will and desire that it shall be divided into five equal shares one share to Daniel one share to Rezin one to Patsy and one to my two grand children John B Burr and Martha W Burr and one share to my son James. If there should be enough of the above mentioned money notes and accounts to pay the above sums it is my will that each be paid their proportional amount and wait until the death of my wife for the ballance. It is my will and desire that my son James have all the tools belonging to both shops. It is my will and desire that at my wifes death the property I have willed her be sold and those of my children and two grand children John and Martha who have not been made equal with my son Daniel in land shall first be made equal and the ballance equally divided between my children and the two grand children John and Martha Burr. It is my will and desire that my daughter Patsy have the children that her negro woman Mary has heretofore had. Finally I hereby appoint and constitute my son Daniel C Boyd and Rezin GH Boyd my Executors to this my last will and testament in writing where of I here unto set my ? and seal this 30th day of September 1841.

September 19th 1846 It is my wish and desire that instead of John B Burr and Martha W Burr receiving four hundred and fifty dollars to make their land equal with my other children I give John B Burr the negro girl Louisa and Martha W Burr the negro girl Lucinda which negros will make their land equal to my other children. Riely Leon Townsend books says the following about John Thomas Watson.

"There is a tradition that Watson was a Presbyterian and came to the Hanover County area of Virginia when so many members of that faith came over. He was in search of his brother, so the story goes, an admiral in the British Navy. Not finding him, John Thomas married a widow in Hanover County. They moved to Pittsylvania County, Virginia soon after the first white men arrived there during the 1740s and settled on Cherryston Creek. The town of Chatham is built on their land."

And "According to his will, dated November 15, 1802, John Thomas Watson and his wife, E. Alice Watson, had six children, three sons and three daughters."

His will can be found in the Pittsylvania County, VA will book no. 1 page 531 dated October 22, 1794. The will was probated in 1802.

In the name of God, Amen October the 22: 1794 I John Watson Se': of Pittsylvania County in the State of Virginia being in perfect health both of Body and mind and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to Die do make Constitute and ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all I Recommend my Soul into the hands of God who give it and as for my Body I recommend it to the earth to be Buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the Direction of my Executors hereafter named and as for my Worldly Goods wherewith it hath pleased God to Bless me with in this life I give devise and dispose of in the manner and form following. Item it is my Will and I do order that in the first place all my just Debts and Burial Charges be paid and Satisfied. Item I give and Bequeath to my Beloved son William Watson and his heirs forever my Dwelling plantation and all the Land thereto Belonging and as for my moveable Estate I also give and Bequeath the whole that I possess to my Son William Watson, whom I Constitute and Ordain to be my only and Sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament. Item I give and Bequeath to my Son Thomas Watson and to my Son, John Watson and to my Daughter Grisill Farthing and to my Daughter Ceziah Hughs and to my Daughter Arphileda Townson and to their heirs forever one Shilling Sterling to each of them to be their full portion of all my whole and Sole Estate to be paid out of my Estate by my Executor, as Witness

By no means least of the noted and splendidly influential families of our name were those founded by two brothers, Robert and Charles Ewing. All the evidence indicates and nothing disputes that they were close cousins of the other immigrants of our family. One tradition has it that they were born in Coleraine, Ireland; while another says they were born near Stirling Castle, Scotland, within the old clan bounds. Whichever be correct, it is certain they were near relatives to those who came from at least not far from Londonderry. A tradition, given me by Rowland D. Buford, of Bedford City, an aged man (in his eighty-sixth year at the time of his letter to me) who knew and respected their descendants, insists that they fled from Scotland because of some political difficulty, being staunch Covenanters who, no doubt, warmly espoused the cause of the Protestant claimants to the English throne. However, I am satisfied that they came, whether from Scotland or Ireland, because of the general unrest which prevailed in both countries, and which I have briefly narrated.

An undisputed tradition says that on reaching America they visited their relations in Cecil County, Maryland, for a short time, and then pushed on for the new lands and broader opportunities in that section shortly to become Bedford County, Virginia, near where Samuel Ewing, James Ewing and other cousins then lived.

The sketch of the Ewings left by Nathaniel Ewing of Mount Clair, Knox County, Indiana, and published in the Courier-Journal, February 28, 1897, after what I have elsewhere quoted continues:

"Some time about the year 1735 or 1740 two young men, cousins of my grandfather, Nathaniel Ewing (the only son of the first wife of William Ewing, born in Scotland), came to America. Their names were Charles and Robert Ewing. Having gotten into an affray at a fair in Ireland, they were so unfortunate as to kill a man, for which they were obliged to fly the country and came to my grandfather's, where they concealed themselves for a length of time until one of my grandfather's half brothers came from Virginia on a visit to his relations in Maryland. On his return they were put over the Susquehanna in the night and went with him to Virginia. It being a place less frequented by emigrants from Ireland than Maryland, and a proclamation having arrived offering a reward for their apprehension, their longer stay became dangerous.

"Some time after their arrival in Prince Edward County a new settlement was founded further back, in what is now called Bedford County, near the Peaks of Otter. They joined the adventurers and finally settled there and married sisters, daughters of Mr. Baker, a Presbyterian minister, and

lived there until death. They both left large families, who are now settled in Kentucky, Tennessee, and Missouri, some of whom I have seen, viz: Baker Ewing, Young Ewing, Samuel Ewing and Finis Ewing. The last is a Presbyterian clergyman and resides in Missouri. I mention the family on account of their having become so numerous in the western country and to show the connection between them and my family."

Exhaustive investigation leads me to the most decided opinion that the "affray at a fair" and its result is an error. Mr. Buford, who never heard of this fair story, was quite confident that the "trouble," whatever it may have been, was nothing other than a mere "political matter" which resulted in no physical encounter. He lived in the county where both Robert and Charles spent most of their distinguished lives; and so had a better opportunity to know their pre-American history than had Nathaniel Ewing whose article was published in the *Courier-Journal*. All the facts, aside from Nathaniel's statement, indicate that at that day Robert and Charles could have been as readily located where they settled in Virginia as had they remained in Cecil County.

That they had committed no grave crime in early life, even in the heat of an unpremeditated encounter, the prominence of their later lives attests. Cossett, the biographer of Finis Ewing, of this Robert and Charles says:

The two brothers appear to have ranked among the most respectable citizens and prosperous farmers of that county [Bedford]. (*Life and Times of Rev. Finis Ewing* (1853), 24.)

Among other things, this Robert or his son became a colonel of Virginia militia. (See his letter to Governor Jefferson in 1 Virginia State Papers, 510; and another of March, 1783, in volume 3, p. 459.) He served in Capt. Thomas Buford's Company of volunteers under General Andrew Lewis, known as Dunmore's Indian war, and was a participant in the famous battle of Point Pleasant, October 10, 1774, as were others of his kindred. (Letter from R. D. Buford; Virginia Colonial Militia, 86.)

Just when these brothers reached Virginia I am not sure; nor do I know where they first lived in that State, then a colony, other than what Nathaniel has said.

In a deed dated January 24, 1755, Robert and Mary, his wife, give their home as in Lunenburg County. The instrument conveys land in Augusta County. The land was patented to Robert Ewing in 1749, according to copies from the records as given by Lyman Chalkley, 3 *Chronicles of the Scotch-Irish Settlement in Virginia*, 338. The work is abstracts of the Augusta records. Augusta County, as we saw, was formed from Orange in 1738, and the first Augusta records begin in 1745. This is the earliest record of Robert in Virginia which I have found. He never lived in Augusta but was reaching out for land. Lunenburg was formed in 1746 from Brunswick, and up to 1753 Bedford County, which became the home of Robert and Charles, was a part of Lunenburg County.

Mr. Buford, writing to me in his eightieth year, says that Robert and Charles came to Bedford from Prince Edward. Prince Edward was formed from Amelia in 1753. But as Robert, taking the recital in the deed of 1755 as correct, did not live in Prince Edward in January, 1755, it is most probable that he was then in that part of Lunenburg which subsequently became Bedford. Amelia was formed from Prince George in 1734; but the records of Amelia give us no light upon either of these brothers. However, it is interesting that those records contain the following deeds:

From George Ewing and wife to Hugh Challers, for 287 acres of land located in Nottoway Parrish, Amelia County, adjoining Baker, dated 27 July, 1749.

The body of the deed describes the grantors as living in Amelia County, State of Virginia, and the acknowledgment was in Amelia County and is dated 25th July, 1749.

From James Ewing and wife, of the county of Amelia, Virginia, to Joshua Ewing, power of Attorney, to convey one-half acre of land, dated 15th June, 1750.

Acknowledged in the County of Amelia, on the 15th June, 1750.

From William Ewing and wife to John Morrow for 400 acres, described as lying on both sides of

Mill Forks of Vaughan's Creek in Amelia County, dated 7th August, 1752.

The body of the deed recites grantors as in Parrish of Nottoway, Amelia County.

From Edward Brafford to Samuel C. Ewing, for 208 ½ acres, described as in Amelia, dated 17th May, 1745.

From Samuel Wallace to Alexander Ewing of Amelia County, Virginia, for 300 acres, described as between Fork Creek and Lalley's Creek in the county of Amelia, adjoining Samuel Ewing and others, dated 5th May, 1753.

From Edward Brathwet to George Ewing, Jr., of Amelia County, for nine acres, bounded by the lands of Wallace, Samuel Ewing and others, dated 2nd January, 1750.

Robert and Charles each acquired landed estates, both in Virginia and later in what became Kentucky. Robert owned land lying along "the south end of Ewing's mountain" and which is now in Wythe County, and near the George Ewing lands.

Robert was the older. For many years he was "clerk of the Bedford County Court, and an elder in the Presbyterian church. He married Miss Mary Baker and became the father of nine sons and three daughters," said Cossitt [sic]. But Buford says Robert was never clerk of the court.

Mr. Buford, than whom no recent man in Bedford County knew more of the genealogy of the prominent families of his county, of these immigrant brothers says that they "were useful, high-toned, wise, intelligent, and public spirited citizens."

Both of the immigrant brothers were staunch Presbyterians, Covenanters of the Scotch faith. They and their neighbor Scotch or Scotch-Irish founded, long before 1774, the historic Peaks of Otter Presbyterian church. Their children's names are upon its roster. In 1774 the congregation presented to the Virginia House of Burgesses a petition saying that they "were willing to contribute their quota in support of the church of England as by law established in this colony of Virginia," with more cheerfulness because allowed the exercise of their religion "which they humbly conceive is well calculated to make men wise here and happy hereafter." Then attention is called to the inconvenience of supporting a clergy of their denomination and they ask a law authorizing lands and slaves to be bought and title to rest in the elders for the benefit of the congregation, and to the use of their minister "as long as he continues in the doctrine and subject to the discipline of the Presbyterian Church as held and exercised by their Sessions, Presbyteries, or Synods."

Among the large number of signers are Robert Ewing, Charles Ewing, Robert Ewing, Jr., Andrew Ewing, John Ewing, Caleb Ewing, and William Ewing. If the Junior Robert who signed was the son of the immigrant, he was not quite fourteen years old according to his tombstone, which says he was born in 1760. This Charles was evidently the son of the immigrant Charles, as the latter died in 1770. This petition was presented in 1774, referred to the "Committee for Religion" of the House of Burgesses on May 17 of that year, and on the twenty-first of that month reported "Reasonable." Thus these Ewings contributed their influence to the planting of another milestone along the road leading to greater religious tolerance in Virginia.

This Robert Ewing's will was probated June 25, 1787, and the codicil is dated May 27, 1787. The codicil is witnessed by Will Ewing, who was a lawyer, Adam Beard and two others. To the wife Mary, who was a daughter of the Rev. Baker, he leaves, during her widowhood, the home plantation and personal property.

This will is witnessed by Sam Ewing and others. A grandson, Bartus Ewing, a son of John Ewing, received "a set of Shew and Knee Silver buckles"; and another grandson, Bartus, son of July Mills, received another set. July Mills received a diamond ring "worth two pistols as a token of her singular obedience." To John and Finis the will gave farms near the Peaks of Otter in Bedford County. Most of the other boys had their faces set toward Kentucky, mentioned in the will as the "Western Country." This elder Robert himself had arranged for vast tracts in the rich Kentucky regions; and owned about "514 acres on the south end of Ewing's Mountain," in what is now Wythe County, Virginia, in addition to other lands in what is yet Bedford County.

To Robert, who married May Baker, it is said were born twelve children; but eleven only are named in Robert's will. Robert, Jr., who became the General Robert Ewing of Kentucky, was the oldest; and Finis (Latin for last) who became the distinguished minister, it is generally reported, was the youngest. However, Mr. Cockrell of Louisville and Judge Ewing of Houston say a twelfth was "Jane (who) married Peter Kelly, a soldier of the Revolution." As named in the will this is the order and spelling, though not indicative of relative ages: Finis, Polly, Robert, Baker, Rubin, Chatham, Young, Urbin, John, July (who married Mills) and Sydney (who married Adam Lynn). In his *The Ewing Genealogy*, Hon. P. K. Ewing has Martha (Betty) where in his will the father has July. She married Capt. John Mills, of Botetourt County, Virginia. Judge Ewing says "Polly (Patty) married John Ewing, son of George Ewing."

There is evidently some confusion regarding the number of daughters, and there may be also regarding the birth of Finis, which is given by Cossett as July 10, 1773. Young and Urbin were not of "full age" at the date of the father's will March 2, 1786, as shown upon its face; and Chatham was not of full age at date of the codicil, May 14, 1787. Finis receives land and other bequests as though of full age and nothing in either document suggests that he was not twenty-one.

Mary Baker Ewing, who became the mother of these children, was the sister of Martha Baker, who married Charles Ewing. Of Mary's personal history Hon. P. K. Ewing says that farther than her parentage he ascertained nothing, then adds: "but surely the mother of a galaxy of sons like hers, who are accredited by history so uniformly with worthy achievements of high order, must have been richly endowed with those attributes which make 'a perfect woman nobly planned.'" This very just compliment is equally applicable to her sister Martha; and, for that matter to many, many of the splendid mothers of our family, who, lost in their husbands, have so nobly contributed to the many "worthy achievements of a high order," accredited by history to an unusual member of all branches of our family.

July, who married Capt. John Mills, probably married in Kentucky, as there is no record of her marriage in Bedford. Robert II married May McLean; Urban (or Urbin) married May Ewing; and Rubin married Frances Whitsell, located in Logan County, Kentucky, and became one of the first justices of its court. Chatham married Elizabeth Campbell, April 22, 1790, as shown by the Bedford records; and of Finis and Robert II we shall see subsequently.

Since no attempt is being made to write a genealogy, I mention only a few of the descendants of this family. Other names may be found in the recent work of Hon. P. K. Ewing and among the data of F. M. Cockrell, of Louisville, Kentucky, and in the material left by the late James L. Ewin, of Washington. D. C.

Through her daughter, Nancy, who married Abraham Boyd, Sidney [sic] (Ann) Lynn's grandson, John Boyd, was long a member of the Congress of the Republic of Texas; another grandson, Lynn Boyd, was a member of the legislature of Kentucky, 1827-'30; a member of Congress in 1834, 1838 to 1854, being speaker of the House 1850-1854; and in 1859 he became lieutenant-governor of Kentucky.

Polly (Patty) married John Ewing (son of George Ewing), of Virginia, and moved to Kentucky where this John Ewing became a member of the first court of Campbell County. Through a son, Urban Epinetus, they have descendants of note in Louisville, Chicago and elsewhere.

Most of the children of Robert Ewing fell in with the westward expansion along the "Old Wilderness Road," leading through Southwest Virginia by what is now Bristol, thence across the mountains into Powell Valley, Lee County (as the region is now), where my own family and other Ewings early located, thence out beyond the enchanting Cumberlands into Kentucky; and, in time, later descendants spread into all parts of the vast, inspiring West. Some sojourned as they went,—for instance, Urbin lived for some time in Washington County, of which he was part of that period sheriff. At Abingdon, the seat of that county, Urbin Ewing, in 1773, was by its court admitted to practice as an attorney at law.

Baker Ewing became identified with Lincoln and Franklin Counties, Kentucky. In 1788 he was in the legislature as a member from Lincoln. He was the first register of the Kentucky Land Office;

and in 1802 represented Franklin County in the legislature.

Young Ewing went early to Kentucky, married three times; in 1792 he was one of the justices of the first court of Logan County; he represented that county in the legislature in 1795; was a member of the constitutional convention; again in the legislature in 1800-1807; in the State senate for many years; Presidential elector in 1824; and with the rank of colonel commanded troops in our war of 1812-'14, distinguishing himself particularly at the battle of the Thames.

Urban Ewing went to Logan County, Kentucky, about 1796. For many years he was a member of the legislature; was a gallant soldier in the war of 1812; and moved to Cooper County, Missouri, about 1819, and there died. He married Mary (Polly) Ewing, daughter of George Ewing, at Abingdon, Virginia, Judge P. K. Ewing says, in 1787, and she died in Lafayette County, Missouri, in 1832. Many of their descendants are today in that State.

Reuben Ewing went to Kentucky, became a member of the constitutional convention, one of the judges of the Logan County "quarterly court" in 1801; and associate justice of the circuit court in 1803; and, of course, he also served in the legislature. He married Frances C. Whitesell and left descendants.

Chatham Ewing married and lived for a short time at Abingdon, Virginia; then he went to Kentucky, and from there to Lafayette County, Missouri, where he died, leaving many descendants.

John Ewing had a wife named Martha (Mary?) and it appears that they remained in Virginia. They had a son, Robert, says Judge Ewing, known in the will of his grandfather as Bartus, as we have seen; and it is said a daughter, Sidney, married Micajah Rowland in 1793; and that another daughter married a Frazier. These children of this John clearly distinguish him from my great-grandfather with whom some of my correspondents have confused him.

All of the children of Robert and May Baker Ewing were born in Bedford County, Virginia.

Robert II, son of the pioneer Robert, was born in 1760; and died in Kentucky July 14, 1832; and is buried, says Judge Ewing, near Adairville Kentucky. On his tombstone we read:

"In memory of General Robert Ewing, a soldier of the Revolution, who departed this life 14th day of July, 1832. He was born in Virginia in 1760, removed to West Tennessee in 1781, from whence he was elected and served two sessions in the North Carolina legislature." Then the inscription tells us that he married Jane McLean on July 4, 1787; removed to Logan County, Kentucky, in 1792; and was elected to the legislature of Kentucky, in 1797, and served twenty-one successive years, sixteen of which were in the senate, during two of which he was its president.

Judge Ewing gives a roster of this Robert Ewing's descendants, among them being many men and women of mark-lawyers, physicians, etc., such as Henry Clay Ewing, once an attorney general of Missouri, and later a commissioner of the supreme court of that State; Mrs. W. A. Dallmeyer, of Jefferson City, Missouri; George Washington Ewing, of Logan County, Kentucky, 1808-1888, once member of the Kentucky legislature, and then a member of the Congress of the Confederate States; and many others.

Other distinguished descendants of the pioneer Robert Ewing are:

Presley K. Ewing is the son of Dr. Fayette Clay Ewing, 1824, a distinguished surgeon and physician, and who was surgeon in the Confederate army. Doctor Ewing was a man of very large fortune. He was the son of Judge E. M. Ewing, who, 1843-47, was chief justice of the highest court of the State of Kentucky. The Biographical Encyclopedia of Kentucky speaks of Judge E. M. Ewing as a lawyer and man in the highest terms. Presley K. was born in Louisiana July 21, 1860. He obtained a thorough education, studied law, and was admitted to the bar of Houston, Texas, in 1882. He became judge of the supreme court of Texas; and is an author of note, *The Ewing Genealogy* (1919), being a recent work from his pen in collaboration with his talented wife now, unhappily, deceased.

The widely known John W. Kerr, once candidate for Vice President of the United States, said:

"Judge Presley K. Ewing of Texas is a profound jurist, a prince among men, and one of the finest democrats between the oceans."

Judge Ewing is a noted orator and has been honored and his great abilities recognized in many happy ways. He married Mary Ellen Williams, one of the most brilliant and distinguished women of Texas, and to them were born two daughters, both married and now residing in New York City.

Of Finis Ewing we know more than of the others of the Robert Ewing family because of the facts left us in his life written by Cossett. That biographer tells us that Finis Ewing "scrupulously respected the rights of others" and "was generally prompt to assert and resolute to maintain his own." He was, we are further told, a man of "indomitable energy of character," independent and self-reliant. He was "a patriotic citizen as well as Christian minister." In the war of 1812-'14 he served both as soldier and chaplain. He belonged to the regiment (Kentucky troop) of which his brother, Young Ewing, was colonel; and the picture recorded by Cossett, when he tells us of the preacher-soldier delivering a sermon to the troop as he sat on his horse, rifle across the saddle pommel, is characteristic of the man and representatives of the time. He spent much of his early manhood in Tennessee. When duty called, he took part in expeditions against murderous Indians. From there he moved to Christian County, Kentucky, serving as postmaster at Ewingsville. He moved to Missouri in 1820; and again, among other activities, became postmaster of another Ewingsville in that State. However, his fame lies in his chief instrumentality as founder of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Differing from the old school Presbyterians upon the doctrine of predestination, he founded a society based upon man's complete free moral agency; and that body grew in numbers until in recent years it reunited with the older church, which, in the meantime had modified the doctrine to which Ewing objected. He died July 4, 1841, age 68, generally regarded as the youngest of his brothers and sisters. Cossett thus estimates him: "Mr. Ewing was emphatically a great as well as good man."

July 10, 1794, from "Walnut bluff, Davidson (County, Tennessee), per safe hand," Finis Ewing wrote Capt. William Ewing in Bedford, on family business, being unable to attend to it on account of wife's health. Says he gave Rubin Ewing a well "authenticated" power of attorney, to deed a tract of land, evidently in Bedford, and to collect money due. The bond for this he sent with the letter to be delivered, adding: "Pray solicit the old Gentleman not to fail in sending me the money as I expect to be sued if I do not get the money." Then he says: "Sir, you have frequently told me that when I made the deed you would bestow on me a chunk of a horse or some present out of the store and I always refused which I now do but if you think proper to bestow anything you may send Mrs. Ewing some trifle out of the store, cloth for a setout coat or something that suits your best judgment. Sir, be assured that I do not ask it."

He speaks of the place from which he writes as a "fresh county of fertile soil."

Cossett says of this Finis Ewing:

He was comely in person, graceful in manner, frank, kind and generous in his disposition. He was considered a young man of fine talents and extraordinary energy and character. [He was a] very good singer and had a strong and melodious voice.

His manners were prepossessing. Smith, a contemporary writer, says: "Mr. Ewing is a man of liberal education and extensive readings."

When he lived in "the Cumberland County," in the midst of which Nashville, Tennessee, now stands, Indian raids were frequent. When the alarm of this danger was given he was always among the first to reach the threatened or beleaguered point; and was "distinguished for his zeal and energy in defense of the settlement," his biographer-friend truthfully says. And the story is all the more interesting to us because this picture of the part played by Finis Ewing is equally true of all the Ewings of pioneer days and frontier hardships and dangers. They were men of action and nerve tempered by sound judgment; and the women bore their part with equal credit.

Early in life Finis Ewing saw the need of preachers along the advance line of civilization and felt the divine sanction to preach the gospel story. The Presbyterian ministers of his church were

slow to brave the hardships and dangers of the frontiers; and as a result Methodism, with its stronger hold on emotional faith and personal experience and its firm grasp of the individual's free will, gathered the harvest as civilization advanced to and beyond the Cumberlands and into Kentucky, West Tennessee, and beyond. Finis Ewing, seeing the need of reform in his church and realizing the need of greater zeal in its ranks, yet unable to effect the needed reforms within his church, put into the organization of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church the principles the older needed; and with splendid zeal and success carried the banner of the new church in friendly co-operation with the Methodist itinerants. Cossett tells us of Ewing's missionary journeys along Indian paths, beset by wolves and liable to savage surprise. When Ewing started as an "exhorter," says that biographer, "many persons had never attended meeting, or heard a sermon since they came to the (Cumberland) County."

At least two of his brothers were active supporters of the new church. At a session of its synod held in Kentucky in 1804, Rubin and Young Ewing filled official layman positions. Cossett says of them: "Rubin was a judge of one of the courts of Kentucky, and Young had been long known in political annals of the State, and was a colonel in the expedition under general Hopkins in the War of 1812."

Winifred W., 1794-1876. She married Henry M. Ruby, leaving descendants.

William Lee Davidson, who died in Illinois in 1846. He served in the Illinois legislature; became major of Illinois troops; became acting governor of Illinois in 1834; was elected United States Senator in 1835; was promoted to general of the militia; and was State auditor at death.

Thomas M., who served in the Kentucky legislature; was Presidential elector in 1832; moved to Missouri and served in the constitutional convention of 1845, leaving issue.

Polly;

Davey;

Baxter, all died young;

Mary Anderson, who married Archibald Kavanaugh, and died in 1837, leaving issue.

Margaret Davidson, married Rev. Robert Sloan and died in Missouri, leaving children.

Pamela Jane, married James W. Read and died in Texas.

Finis Young, who left issue in Kentucky.

Washington Perry, who married Aletha Jane Ewing, granddaughter of Chatham Ewing, leaving issue.

Robert Chatham Donnell, who married Maria L. Harris, leaving issue.

Ephrim Brevard. He and his brother were lawyers of note. This Ephrim was Secretary of the State of Missouri in 1849; served in the legislature; was elected Attorney General of the State; and in 1859 was elected a judge of the Missouri supreme court; and after the first again became a judge of the supreme court. See The Green Bag, October, 1899. He left issue of marked ability, one of whom, a grandson, is Francis M. Cockrell, of Louisville, Kentucky, the genealogist of his family, as I have heretofore observed. The latter's mother was Anna Ewing, daughter of this Judge E. B. Ewing. She married Francis Marion Cockrell, who became a brigadier general in the Confederate Army; and later United States Senator from Missouri. I had the fortune to interview Senator Cockrell several times before he died in 1905. The Senator's grandfather was one of the pioneers of Powell Valley, Lee County, Virginia, and for thirty-five years was a neighbor of my grandfather.

Another descendant of this Judge Ewing was Alice Brevard, 1848-1914. She married John R. S.

Walker, of Missouri, who was also a distant descendant of the immigrant Robert Ewing. He was a man of deserved prominence and filled positions of high responsibility. (See Judge P. K. Ewing's The Ewing Genealogy and other sources.)

So that it is no surprise that a Dr. Burt of Kentucky distinguishes an era in the history of Logan County, Kentucky, as "When the Ewings came and brought the law with them."

Text of Daniel Boyd's Will which was probated 1797, the year he died.

In the name of God Amen, I, Daniel Boyd of Logan County and State of Kentucky, being very sick and weak of body; but of perfect mind and memory thanks be ever unto God, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament and as touching my worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life. I leave (word illegible) and dispose of the same in the following manner and form. First, I give and bequeath to Ruth Boyd, my dearly beloved wife, two cows, one bed, two pots and the table furniture also her maintenance of the Plantation during her widowhood. Also I give to my two youngest sons, John and Matthew Boyd, all that tract of land I now live on except twenty-five acres sold to Edward Richey to run agreeable to the lines already marked which twenty-five acres I allow my executors to make a deed to said Richey. I also give my son John a three year old brown horse and to my son Matthew Boyd, a year old past filly and all the farming utensils to be equally divided between my said sons and Matthew and my sorrell mare is to continue on the place to be for the use of supporting and keeping up the place until my two young sons come of age and then said mare and her increase to be equally divided between my said sons and my youngest daughter, Elizabeth Boyd. Also, I give to my eldest daughter, Janey Boyd, said mares, spring colt, one bed and loom and one brown heifer rising two years old, her weaving for my wife, two sons, and youngest daughter as long as she lives with them. I also give to my daughter, Francis Boyd, a live year old Bay horse colt, a spotted three year old cow and calf and one bed. I also allow all my stock of Hogs, a three year old heifer and a two year old white steer to continue on the place for the support of the family. I also give to my youngest daughter, Elizabeth Boyd, my brown mare and all remainder of my cattle and they to be supported of the farm until next fall and then the mare cattle and their increase to be sold at twelve months credit and the money arising therefrom to be let out at interest until my said daughter Elizabeth arrives to full age or until she marries. My said daughter Elizabeth is to have a common support of the Plantation her giving every reasonable assistance by industry she is also to have twelve months schooling which schooling is to be paid equally by the legalized debts due said estate (if as much) is to pay all my lawful debts and the balance if any is to be disposed at the discretion of the executors for supporting said family. I likewise constitute make and ordain my trusty friends Edmond Richey and Ralph Fleming my sole executors of this my last will and testament in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this tenth day of October in the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety seven. Signed sealed and published by said Daniel Boyd in presents of us: Robt. Ewing Chatham Ewing.

Codisel - As it appears doubtful a rite may not be obtained for the above mentioned tract of land it is my intention and I wish it to be so understood that my wife Ruthy is to have as reasonable allowance and that as the discretion of my executors out of the money arising or received for said land. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this ninth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred ninety seven. Signed and sealed by said Daniel Boyd in the presence of us: Robert Ewing, Caleb Brite (his mark "X")

At a court held for Logan County at the Courthouse in Russellville on the day of the Last will and testament of Daniel Boyd deceased was produced in Court by Edward Richey and Ralph Fleming the executors therein mentioned with the codicil thereto amended and proved by the oath of Robert Ewing, Chatham Ewing and Caleb Brite three subscribing Witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded.

WILL OF CHRISTOPHER ORNDORFF In the name of God Amen, I Christopher Orndorff, of Logan County and state of Kentucky, being very sick and weak in body but sound mind and memory thanks be given to God and knowing that it is appointed unto all men once to die do make this last Will and Testament, that is to say principally and first of all I recommend my sole to God who gave it and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent christian burial at the discretion of my friends. And touch ing my worldly estate witnesseth, it hath pleased God to help me in this life, I give, devise and dispose of it in the following manner and form. Item

- I will and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Orndorff during her natural life, one third part of all my real estate also . . . my negro Warner Aucky during her natural life, and after her death to my daughter Delilah Orndorff as long as she remains single but if she marries Aucky is then free. Item

- I will and bequath unto my sons John Orndorff and Aaron Orndorff, all the land that was laid off including mills, houses, unticles to them their heirs and assigns for ever. Item - whereas I have given my son Christian Orndorff the full amount of his legacy heretofore, I will that he shall enjoy the benefits resulting therefrom. Item

- I will and bequath to my son Esau Orndorff two hundred acres of land where he now lives to him and his heirs and assigns forever. Item

- I will and bequath unto my son Enoch Orndorff adjoining John and Aaron Orndorff's land, also my wagon, horses, gears and all unticels belonging to my farm and my clock to him and his heirs and assigns forever. Item

- I will and bequath unto my daughter Leah Morgan two hundred acres of land including a Moity, I will hereafter name and including the place where William Morgan now lives and running with the Nashville road her heirs and assigns forever. Item

- I will and bequath unto my daughter Delilah Orndorff two hundred acres of land adjoining Leah Morgan including a Moity of timber, I will hereafter name running with the Nashville road to Chick's line. I hereby bequath unto her a full legacy of household goods stock and &, as the rest of my daughters that are married, to her and her heirs and assigns forever. Item

- I will and bequath unto my daughter Elizabeth Miller all the balance of my barrorer on the east side of the Nashville road to her heirs and assigns forever. Item - As there will be a balance of timber I will and bequath it to my three daughters jointly, Elizabeth, Leah and Delilah Orndorff to be divided by my Executors to them or their assigns forever.
